A Word from the Pastor The Resurrection comes (to all who experience it) as the ultimate endorsement that **we are going to be okay**. It is a word that says: "The worst thing that can happen is small potatoes compared to the best thing that has already happened." The Resurrection is God's "yes" to life, and God's "yes" to us.

That's why the ultimate argument for the Resurrection has always been most evident, not in stories of the empty tomb nor the resurrection appearances, but in the change that the Resurrection produced in the lives of those who believed it. Not because life suddenly brought more to them, but that they suddenly brought more to life. The Resurrection says: "No matter how much is piled on top of us, nor in front of us, its totality shall not be sufficient to defeat us." That is the good news of Easter!

Somewhere, several years ago, I read an account of the funeral service of Winston Churchill. I don't know whether the incident is true or legendary, but it goes like this:

At the end of the committal service at the burial site in one of England's great cathedrals, a bugler sounded "Taps" from some far corner.

"Day is done. Gone the sun, from the earth, from the sea, from the sky. Day is done, all is well; God is nigh."

After the service and the notes of the bugle had died away, as the people stood standing in a moment of silence as people almost invariably do, almost ready to begin to walk away, from far up in the heights of the bell tower, as if coming from some other world, a second bugle sounded "Reveille"-the wake-up call.

Friends, Christians are a people **who have heard the call of the second bugle**. We have learned that good news can come to God's people anywhere – and at Easter we remember that it came first and strongest and most enduringly from a graveyard. Thanks be to God. Drew

Room in the Inn/Room at the Table The season for Room in the Inn will soon be coming to an end. Our last time to host these men will be on Tuesday, April 9th. Please look at the sign-up sheet by the church office to see where you can help. Thank you so much for the outpouring of support for this ministry.

Although Room in the Inn will be closing for the season (and reopening in the Fall), our feeding/nutrition ministry will not end. Our ministry will shift its focus to providing food for the homeless/near homeless who are housed in several Jackson area hotels. We are calling this ministry Room at the Table. Once a month, Forest Heights will provide a meal at Studio 45 (formally The Scottish Inn). Our meals will be simpler as we will be feeding almost 100 men, women, and children. Once again, you will have an opportunity to provide food items and to serve. We will begin this ministry in May.

Adult Sunday School Class You are invited to a summer study of Adam Hamilton's book <u>Words of Life- Jesus and the Promise of the Tenn Commandments Today</u>. This 12-week study begins June 2 and continues through August. You are welcome to join the study on Sunday mornings from 9:30- 10:15. It was devastating and she truly believes that God was her comfort during her pain as He always is.

Jean has always been active in her churches. She became a Methodist when she married Dave, knowing she could never make a Baptist out of him. They were active at St. Paul's UMC in Memphis and later at Aldersgate. Jean enjoys being a part of Forest Heights and especially likes Pastor Drew's Bible Study on Wednesdays.

Always active, Jean held offices in the Madison County Jaycettes, United Way, Altrusa (a service organization), the American Association of Medical Transcriptionists, and recently the Red Hatters, and the Jackson Women's Club.
