A Word from Pastor Drew

James 5:13-14, 16, 19-20

¹³ Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise. ¹⁴Are any among you sick? They should call for the elders of the church and then pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord... ¹⁶ Confess your sins to one another, and pray for one another so the you may be healed. ¹⁹My brothers and sisters, if anyone among you wanders from the truth and is brought back by another, ²⁰you should know that whoever brings back a sinner from wandering will save the sinner's soul from death and will cover a multitude of sins.

In her bestselling book, <u>Traveling Mercies</u>, Anne Lamott explains why she makes her son go with her to church. She says, "The main reason is that I want to give him what I found in the world, which is a path and a little light to see by. Most of the people I know who have what I want – purpose, heart, balance, gratitude, joy – are people with a deep sense of spirituality. They are people in community who pray or practice their faith, people banding together to work on themselves and for human rights. They follow a brighter light than the glimmer of their own candle, they are part of something beautiful." Then she says, "When I was at the end of my rope, the people at my church tied a knot in it for me and helped me hold on."

The book of <u>James</u> pictures the church as the place where fellowship, prayer, and singing go hand in hand. Verse 13 says, "Are any among you suffering? They should pray. Are any cheerful? They should sing songs of praise." It's a place where people confess their sins to one another and are restored; where people visit the sick and pray for them; where people are cheerful and sing for joy. On any given Sunday the church contains people who are near giving birth and those who are near dying. On one side is a young mother who feels her life will never be right after her divorce. On the other side is a woman newly engaged, who anticipates that marriage will be the closest thing to heaven. There is a young man who is not sure he believes in God anymore; there is one preparing for ministry. There is a woman who fears for her life after her recent diagnosis of cancer; there is one celebrating her fourth time as a survivor of breast cancer.

Life together in the church is a mixture of people at every stage of life. Take any one of these people apart from the community of faith and her/his life would be so much less. One of the secrets of church is that it is life lived in community. Theologian Robert McAfee Brown has said, "I believe that we are placed here to be companions – a wonderful word that comes from *cum manis* (with bread). We are here to share bread with one another so that everyone has enough." As we become companions among ourselves, awareness grows that such companionship deserves to be extended. Our bread – our faith – is shared. God lives not, I think in the bread and wine, but in the breaking of bread, the sharing of wine. Bread unbroken does not fortify the heart. But bread divided among all who hunger will sustain the spirit. There is just something about sharing our bread, sharing our faith, sharing our lives together in the Church of Jesus Christ that makes life right. This rightness is a home for the heart.

Anne Lamott relates a story told by her pastor. When the pastor was seven years old, she had a best friend who got lost one day. "The little girl ran up and down the streets of the big town where they lived,

but she couldn't find a single landmark. She was very frightened. Finally, a policeman stopped to help her. He put her in the passenger seat of his car and drove around until she finally saw her church. She pointed it out to the policeman, and then she told him firmly, "You could let me out now. This is my church, and I can always find my way home from here.""

Then Anne Lamott concluded with these words, "And that is why I have stayed so close to (my church) – because no matter how bad I am feeling, how lost, or lonely, or frightened, when I see the faces of the people at my church, and hear their familiar voices, I can always find my way home."

Conference News Some people have asked who will be the new bishop for the Tennessee-West Kentucky Conference of which we are a part of here at Forest Heights. Bishop William McAlilly is retiring at the end of August. The Southeast Jurisdictional Conference moved bishops this past week and have assigned Bishop David Graves to be our bishop starting September 1. He has been a bishop since 2016 and is coming from South Georgia Conference and Alabama-West Florida Conference. He is a native to Knoxville, graduating with his bachelor's degree from UT Knoxville. His master's degree in divinity is from Emory University in Atlanta. He will be the residing bishop of the Kentucky Conference (all but West Kentucky) and the Central Missionary Appalachian Conference (Redbird).

Our former district superintendent Dan Camp has retired so Bishop McAlilly has developed a different system of this job into a new Cohort District Superintendent (CDS). Reverend Sharon Karamoko will be our CDS for the counties of Madison, Haywood, Crockett, and Lauderdale while she will continue to be the pastor at Wesley Chapel.
