A Word from Pastor Drew

"...giving thanks to God the Father at all times, and for everything..." (Ephesians 5:20a)

It sounds on the surface, like an impossible commandment. ".. at all times, and for everything..." What are we to make of this incredibly bold statement by Paul. How do we give thanks for the hard times, the tragedies, the things that people do to one another? How do you give thanks for a bad day? The longer I live, the more I realize the impact of attitude on life. It is more important than the past, than education, than money, than circumstances, than failures, than successes, than what other people think or say or do. It is more important than appearance, giftedness, or skill. It will make or break a company, a church, a home. I am convinced that life is 10% what happens to me, and 90% how I react to it.

Corrie Ten Boom in her autobiography, *The Hiding Place*, relates an incident which taught her this principle. After have been capture by the Nazis in WWII she and her sister, Betsy, had just been transferred to the worst German prison camp they had seen yet, Ravensbrück. Upon entering the barracks, they found them extremely overcrowded and flea-infested. Their Scripture reading that morning in **1 Thessalonians** had reminded them **to rejoice always, pray constantly, and give thanks in all circumstances.** Betsy told Corrie to stop and thank the Lord for every detail of their new living quarters. Corrie at first flatly refused to give thanks for the fleas, but Betsy persisted. She finally succumbed. During the months spent at that camp, they were surprised to find how openly they could hold Bible study and prayer meetings without guard interference. It was several months later when they learned that the guards would not enter barracks because of the fleas.

The power of gratitude enabled Paul to tap into the everlasting grace of God. It energized him. It enabled him to see life in the face of death, to see faith in the face of doubt, to see hope in the face of despair. It enabled him to draw the power of the kingdom into his own being and feed it out to other people. And all of that is available to you and me-when we are grateful, when we are thankful. Many people are frightened because the future looks uncertain. Some are afraid because they have listened to those who play upon the fears of their brothers and sisters for personal gain – either political or financial. Many of the folks are angry, because the economy has cost them their jobs or their security. Many are bitter, because they believe they are powerless to do anything. I sympathize with these folks, but I want to say honestly this morning that I do not agree with them. My future is not at <u>all</u> uncertain, and I am not insecure, because my life is in the hands of God who loves me – right where it should be, has always been, and will always be. And we are not powerless, because we possess the most powerful gift of all – the gift of gratitude.
