A Word from Pastor Drew

"And Nathan said to David. "You are the man!" (2 Samuel 12:7)

As a prophet, Nathan was called by God to speak truth to power – always a dangerous calling. He approached David not with a detailed list of David's wrongs, but with a story. Sometimes we see ourselves more clearly in stories than we do when someone is pointing their finger at us in anger, allowing us to become guarded and defensive. Stories draw us in without us even noticing it. For Nathan, it was a strategy borne out of genuine concern and love both for David and for God. What he wanted was not to trick David into pronouncing his own judgment, but to make certain that what David heard in the story Nathan told was translated into what David felt about his own actions.

Nathan told David of a poor man who had a pet lamb. That man loved that lamb like his own child. But one day, a rich man, who had many lambs of his own, came and took that beloved lamb away from the poor man to slaughter it and feed it to his guests. David could see that little lamb and he could feel the pain of the poor man. David became angry at the evil which the rich man had done and declared that he should be put to death for doing such a terrible thing. "But David," Nathan said to him, "you are that man!"

Nathan's parable caused David to wake up from his self-righteousness and insulation. He had taken the wife of a loyal soldier for his own desires, and then had the soldier killed in battle to cover his sin. David was acting like the emperor in his new clothes, parading around in his sin with no one willing to or able to hold up a mirror and show him that the royal immunity to which he felt entitled was invisible. But Nathan helped David to see himself and to see what he had done. And unlike the emperor who continued to parade around with no clothes, David repented. You don't have to be a poet or a prophet to tell stories that transform the imagination, to put a new spirit in others. By virtue of our baptism, we Christians are already armed with stories that can

spirit in others. By virtue of our baptism, we Christians are already armed with stories that can witness to the goodness of God's future. We have heard the greatest story of all, the story of God's love and grace, a story of Christ's birth, life, death, and resurrection. There is now always a story of hope, of light shining into the darkness, of death being defeated and of suffering, pain, and despair lasting only a night because we know and testify to the goodness of joy coming with each morning. That is our story.

That is the foundation of our prophetic voice, called upon to transform both our neighbor and our neighborhood, powerful enough to change those who hear it, and powerful enough to transform those who tell it.

Anita was fortunate to grow up in the historic mill village of Bemis, TN, where the mill whistle let you know when all children had to be home for the night (9pm whistle). With the exception of 15 years in Memphis, Anita has lived her life in Madison County.

Anita met her husband, Michael Montgomery (son of Rev. Harold & Rebecca Montgomery), at South Side High School. Several years later, they married and will celebrate their 31st anniversary this year. Michael attends Grace Bible Fellowship Church in Huntersville. Anita and Michael spent 20 years living in and renovating their pre-Civil War home in Mercer, TN, before moving back to Jackson. They have traveled extensively during the last 30 years, agreeing that their two favorite trips were to Egypt and to the Holy Land.

Anita is a graduate of South Side High School, Jackson State Community College, Union University, and was in the last graduating class of "Memphis State University," where she earned her Masters in Rehabilitation Counseling. In Memphis, she worked at Ward Archer Advertising, at the in-house advertising agency for Schering-Plough and at Media Services. While in Memphis, Anita volunteered over 1,300 hours in the Veteran's Hospital Emergency Room, was a short-term "baby hugger" at LeBonheur, and in 1986 was fortunate to join, along with Michael, in the coast to coast human chain fundraiser, *Hands Across America*. After moving back to Jackson, Anita first worked as a Licensed Psychological Examiner, primarily in area school systems. Her last 24 years prior to retirement were spent at West Tennessee Healthcare, where she was the Marketing Manager in the inpatient rehabilitation center for 10 years (where you saw miracles happen *every day*), then as the first Director of the Patient Experience the last 14 years. What brought joy to Anita's work was being able to share stories of *incredible kindness* about staff and physicians throughout the organization who went far and above anything expected to make things better for patients and families. Some of these "Hearts Afire" stories are still hanging on the walls at Jackson-Madison County General Hospital. Read one sometime if you want to be truly inspired by depths of caring and compassion!

In her free time, Anita enjoys reading, attending concerts & plays, delivering Meals on Wheels, and watching Perry Mason (she has every episode memorized!). She's an officer of the Bemis Historical Society and of the Bemis Book Club, the longest continuously meeting book club in Madison County. Anita has long felt that her greatest gift is her smile - a gift that she effortlessly shares with all.
